


- Founded in 2005

- More than 10 languages spoken among the team members




CLIENT PROFILE: REASON FOR INTAKE



CLIENT PROFILE: COUNTRY OF ORIGIN





CLIENT PROFILE: AGE

Connecting clients to healthcare regardless of immigration status or ability to pay Providing education about chronic diseases and healthy living Vaccines, testing, and screenings

COMMUNITY PERCEPTIONS OF HEPATITIS B

- · Confused with Malaria jaundice symptoms can be similar
- Taboo and stigma, like HIV/AIDS
 - Shame
 - Don't talk about it
- Lack of knowledge about its spread

GETTING TREATMENT

- · Testing is scary! It's better not to know, rather than have a positive test
 - Positive test result \rightarrow Follow up care \rightarrow Expensive and time consuming
- Navigation isn't easy for undocumented and uninsured

OUR APPROACH

- Embedding HepB education and screenings into our overall health programming
- Workshops about many health topics, Hepatitis is just one of many
- AFAHO Health Screening Day, Hepatitis screening is just one of many

Approximately 210 total attendees

63 received HepB screenings

35 protected against HepB

21 need a vaccine

7 positive results (11%)
