Health Myths & Misconceptions AI Definition of health

Bad health is extreme physical limitation

Primary care is a waste of time

Bad health is punishment from God

Would rather not know about diseases: Don't seek out diagnosis and resist treatments



Hep B Myths and Misconception

- Contacted through mosquito bite
- Not Common in the African Immigrant community
- Is the same as Yellow Fever
- Can be cured by prayer and supplication/fasting/traditional healer
- Can transmit through hand shaking, coughing, close contact, sharing eating utensils
- Curse from enemy
- Cannot eat protein if Hep B positive
- Cannot be pregnant if positive
- Must self isolate if positive cannot be around people



Impact of Myths and Misconceptions

- 55 years old died of Hep B in 2019 in Nigeria. Came to the US to visit, got sick and went home for traditional treatment . Although the sister is an RN, he did not disclose that he had Hep B. He had developed liver cancer by the time his sister learned of his diagnosis.
- Chicago community member died in 2019. He knew he had the disease but kept it to himself and did not seek treatment until it was too late.
- 32-year-old died from liver cancer. She did not know she had Hep B until she developed liver cancer.



Ways AHC Addresses Myths and Misconceptions

- Be a good listener
- Building trust/relationship
- Respecting the communities' views
- Acknowledging needs
- Validating fears while providing facts
- Communication to increase awareness
- Meeting people where they are
- Flexibility
- Providing incentives
- Meeting basic needs and connecting to resources
- Nonjudgmental
- Consistency
- Follow up



Ola's response to Hepatitis B diagnosis.

- I cannot have Hepatitis B. I am not sick and I don't feel sick.
- I reject this in Jesus name. Hepatitis B is sent back to the sender.
- I will call home tomorrow and order some natural supplements and herbs that I can use

to cure the disease.

• Let's call the man of God for prayer. I will not

die but live. I shall not die insha Allah



Case Result Discussion

- Ola's older sister, brother and their families are negative.
- Ola's younger sister is Hep B positive, follow up in place.
- Ola's aunt revealed the family secret that Ola's mother died of Hep B which she caught during blood transfusion at Ola's delivery. Although she started late, Ola's mother received both medical and traditional treatments.
- Ola's father denied, he was Hep B positive till his death. He used a lot of traditional herbs, but never received medical treatment. He later died of liver cancer.
- Ade's siblings are both Hep B negative.
- Ade caught Hep B from his ex-girlfriend who was later tested and referred.
